A Message from the President

This past year ended on a high note—literally and figuratively—with a concert in August to conclude the college's 60th anniversary. Billed as Niagara County's Biggest Birthday Party, it was the perfect capstone for six decades of progress on campus, partnerships across the region and prosperity for NCCC alumni. Yet this magical evening was just one of several mileposts from 2022-2023 that deserve noting.

In spring 2023, we learned that the college had the highest graduation rate among SUNY's community colleges. Equally impressive, a study by Buffalo's pre-eminent business publication concluded that our graduates' median earnings are higher than those of their counterparts who graduated from western New York's other community colleges. These superlatives underscore why NCCC remains the smart place to start.

In fall 2022, the college began developing a strategic enrollment management plan that will guide a comprehensive effort to attract a more diverse student body. Parallel to this undertaking, we launched NCCC at Night, to give those going back to school a structured, in-person option for earning their degrees.

A ceremonial groundbreaking in July marked the start of construction of the Niagara County Law Enforcement Academy's new home on our campus. Collaboration among Niagara County, the Niagara County Sheriff's Department, several other police agencies and the college drove this project. The result will be a model facility for criminal justice training in western New York.

August brought the commissioner of the New York State Office for People With Development Disabilities for a press conference recognizing NCCC for being the first college in SUNY to offer a direct support microcredential program leading to national certification in the field of developmental disabilities. This program reflects the College's shared commitment to meet students' needs, respond to new opportunities for education and serve all who call the Niagara region home.

Within these pages are only some of the reasons that 2022-2023 will be remembered for generating momentum that surely foreshadows even greater things to come. As always, thank you for your support of NCCC.



President's Medallion Award



NCCC at Night

NCCC at Night, an evening college designed with busy adults in mind, took shape in 2023, offering degrees and certificates from Accounting, Business, Computer Aided Drafting & Design, Direct Support Professional, Early Childhood Studies, Liberal Arts and Sciences, Physical Education Studies, Practical Nursing, Teaching Assistant and Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages programs. NCCC at Night offers students access to academic resources including our library, academic coaches, tutoring, workshops, OIT assistance, and personalized advisement. Other supports include credit for prior learning, extended dining services hours and assistance throughout the financial aid process.

Commencement

Over 800 students earned the right to receive their diplomas at the conclusion of the spring 2023 semester. Nearly 290 crossed the stage at the college's 59th commencement on May 13.

Graduates, their family members and guests enjoyed remarks by Dr. Mark Bonacci, who encouraged students to be mindful of self-care and a rousing keynote address from Niagara Falls City School District Superintendent Mark Laurrie. Among other speakers were President's Medallion recipient Meredith Preve and President Murabito, who noted graduates' trajectory through a pandemic to the ceremony.

The NCCC Jazz Band, directed by Music Instructor Joshua Wagner, performed the Miles Davis classic "All Blues." In a first for NCCC, the college incorporated a land acknowledgement into the proceedings with guidance from Jill Clause of the Tuscarora Nation Turtle Clan, who delivered the ceremony's invocation and the benediction.

NCCC Turns 60

NCCC's commemoration of its 60th anniversary began in October of 2022. The college wove its theme, "Honoring the Past and Reimagining the Future," into activities including the Diamond Scholarship Gala, Veterans Day program, Gingerbread Wonderland installation at the Niagara Falls Culinary Institute, Commencement, and Nerds Gone Wild concert.



Niagara County Law Enforcement Academy Training Center

Officials from Niagara County, including Legislature Chairman Becky Wydysh and Sheriff Michael Filicetti, joined President Murabito and representatives from several regional police agencies at a ceremonial groundbreaking for the Niagara County Law Enforcement Academy training facility on July 25. The county and college partnered to fund the \$8.3 million project. The 15,000 square-foot building, located on the west side of the college's campus, will feature classrooms with movable walls, men's and women's locker rooms, a reality-based training room and a use-of-force simulator. A ribbon cutting is anticipated in 2024.

Other capital projects included a \$500,000 investment to reconfigure and renovate a 6,000 square-foot space in our G Building to provide space for student clubs to meet and host activities. The footprint will also include gaming area breakout rooms for students to use.

To address the growing need for skilled trades workers, the college has begun construction of a workspace for machining and welding instruction in a dedicated 10,000 square-foot technology arts and advanced manufacturing center.

Among the \$750,000 in enhancements to allied health programs this past year are a new radiological lab, nursing simulator lab and surgical technology lab featuring advanced simulators.

We are excited for new growth in summer 2024.

Day of Giving



Championship Teams

Baseball (44-7 overall)

The baseball program won its third consecutive Region III Div. III championship. The Thunderwolves made their eighth appearance since 2008 at the NJCAA Div. III World Series, finishing fourth in the country.

Women's Basketball (29-5 overall)

The women's basketball program was Region III Div. II champions for the fifth consecutive season. The Thunderwolves won a second consecutive East District title to punch their fourth ticket to the NJCAA Div. II Tournament in the past five seasons.

Men's Basketball (30-3 overall)

The men's basketball program brought home the Region III Div. II championship for the third straight year. The Thunderwolves won a second consecutive East District title en route to their fourth trip to the NJCAA Div. Il Tournament in the past seven years.



Thunderwolves Drafted to Major League Baseball

Pitchers Ryan Birchard (left) and Brendan Morse (right) were the latest Thunderwolves picked in the Major League Baseball Draft. Birchard, an All-American sophomore, was selected by the Milwaukee Brewers with pick No. 155 in the fifth round. Morse, an NCCC freshman, was selected by the Texas Rangers with pick No. 531 in the 18th round.

Birchard is the highest NCCC draft pick since head coach Matt Clingersmith took over the program in 2006. They represent the fifth and sixth draft picks during Clingersmith's tenure and are the first set of NCCC teammates to be selected in the same year since 1969.

SUNY Cannabis Workforce Grant – Joint Collaboration

Thanks to an innovative partnership between the College's Horticulture program and Workforce Development Department, NCCC has paved the way for community cannabis education through a \$1 million SUNY Cannabis Workforce Development grant award. Through this funding, the College is leading a consortium of SUNY Erie, Genesee Community College, and Jamestown Community College in the continued development of both credited and non-credit education within the cannabis industry over the next two years. Programming is supported by an Industry Advisory Council of businesses across the field to encompass all levels of the "Seed to Sale" process. NCCC hosted an annual Cannabis Conference was held in January 2023, where program impact was highlighted, representing one of the premier regional opportunities for networking within the state for businesses and individuals seeking entry. NCCC is proud to act as the project lead and sole recipient of grant funding investment for upstate New York.

Future Leaders Liberty Partnership Program

In a first for the College, a five-year award was attained for the continuation of the Future Leaders Liberty Partnership Program, which included participation from the four largest school districts in its service region with the City of Niagara Falls, City of North Tonawanda, City of Lockport, and Niagara Wheatfield Central School districts. The award was the maximum allowable through New York State Education Department (NYSED) funding at \$2,250,000 over five years. Through this investment, NCCC will continue to offer services, including dropout prevention, career development, and college readiness to 360 at-risk students annually throughout Niagara County. NCCC, along with its partner districts, administers programming including student interest assessments, tutoring, academic support, social events, mentorship, community service, family engagement, professional development opportunities, college visits, career days, financial literacy training, and summer workshops.



Direct Support Professional Microcredential

NCCC is proud to offer the first direct support microcredential program among SUNY.

SUNY, in partnership with the NYS Office for People With Developmental Disabilities, developed this program to recognize the distinct skills and competencies required of today's direct support professionals. The program will provide training that leads to national certification in the field of developmental disabilities.
