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INTRODUCTION

Welcome! The College Acceleration Program (CAP) at SUNY Niagara lets you jump-start your college journey, tackling real college-level courses and earning credits before you even graduate high school. Taking these courses will help students learn about college expectations, time management, and academic rigor, showing that they have what it takes to succeed. Additional benefits may include:

- Saving money by reducing future college costs (by earning college credit while still in high school).
- Many CAP students graduate from college a semester or more ahead of schedule, which can save additional tuition costs.
- Strengthening your college application by showing admissions officers that you took challenging courses in your junior and senior years.
- Lightening your course load in your first year of college, reducing stress and giving you more flexibility.
- Making room for opportunities such as more electives, a double major, special internships, or study abroad.

OVERVIEW OF CAP

CAP is a concurrent enrollment program established as a cooperative agreement of the State University of New York (SUNY), colleges, and high schools, allowing high school students to take college classes in their high schools for both high school and college credits.

SUNY Niagara is an affiliate member of NACEP (National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships). For more information about NACEP and the national standards, [please see NACEP's website](http://www.nacep.org).

CAP courses are most often taught right at your high school, giving you the convenience of earning both high school and college credit without leaving campus. In these classes, your high school teachers—approved as SUNY Niagara adjunct instructors—follow the same academic standards, grading policies, and course requirements as our college faculty. These courses follow your high school calendar and are offered at a reduced tuition rate.

For students looking to take classes through SUNY Niagara directly rather than through their home high school, this falls outside of CAP. Please follow the [SUNY Niagara process for non-matriculated students](#).

PLACEMENT TESTING

Students not meeting the above criteria for ENG 101 and/or MAT 116 and/or MAT 164 must take the SUNY Niagara Placement Tests in Reading and Writing, administered by the Testing Center (A-167). The tests are delivered online.

CAP VS. ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP)

Both CAP and AP offer challenging courses for qualified students, but there are important differences. **CAP courses are directly connected to SUNY Niagara**, meaning you are officially enrolled as a SUNY Niagara student and have the same privileges as any other college student. AP courses, in contrast, have no direct affiliation with a college or university.

Credit transferability can vary for both programs, so it's important to check with your future college. The biggest difference lies in how you earn the credit:

- **AP:** Your score on one “all-or-nothing” exam at the end of the year determines whether you earn college credit.
- **CAP:** You are graded throughout the semester by your teacher, so you always know where you stand and your final grade is based on the full semester's work.

TRANSCRIPT REQUEST/TRANSFER OF CREDIT GUIDELINES

Most colleges will accept SUNY Niagara credit earned in high school if a grade of C or better is earned. State University of New York (SUNY) system colleges accept SUNY Niagara CAP credits. It is the discretion of private colleges and universities and those not in the SUNY system to decide whether they will accept transfer credits from another college or university in the country. It is strongly recommended that the students check with the college or university of their choice for acceptance of CAP transfer credit before registering for a CAP course. CAP credits can be accepted several ways:

- Credit hours can be directly transferred toward a chosen degree.
- They can be accepted as elective credits.
- They can exempt students from taking a required course, or they can make students eligible for placement into a higher level of course sequence.
- They may allow students advanced standing when applying to highly selective institutions of higher education.

If there is uncertainty about whether a specific college will accept SUNY Niagara credits, students should contact the chairperson of the academic department for their intended major or the college registrar. While a definitive answer is often not possible until after the course is completed and an official transcript is received, most colleges can provide information about their general credit-transfer policies. To support the evaluation process, students are encouraged to present a CAP course syllabus and a portfolio of completed coursework to college officials who may require more detailed information before granting credit.

After completing a SUNY Niagara course in high school through CAP, **follow the**

steps below to obtain an “official” transcript to be sent to the intended college. Do not attempt to use a high school transcript to receive College credit.

- Read the Ordering Overview then click “Please Choose One of the Following Options”
- Enter student and ordering information

At the **end of June/beginning of July**, all grades should be in for CAP classes and this is the recommended time to order your official transcripts. **You must select “Hold for High School CAP (College) Courses” to ensure that final grades are included.** You do not need your student ID number to order through Parchment.

UNOFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS (copy without college seal) ARE AVAILABLE AT NO CHARGE.

CAP students can email and attach a signed and dated letter of request to records@niagaracc.suny.edu and include the following **required** information:

- First and last name (include all previous last names if different than current name)
- Banner ID# or date of birth
- Last 4 digits of social security #
- Current address
- Phone #
- Fax # or address to which the unofficial transcript is to be sent (please note, unofficial transcripts cannot be emailed)
- Signature (a **written signature is required** – typed signatures are not accepted)
- Date

REGISTRATION AND PAYMENT

Your instructor will distribute information about the program and registration to eligible students. Registration application and information are available on the [SUNY Niagara CAP webpage](#). Be sure to let your parents know about this option so they understand the program's requirements, registration, participation, payment, credits, and how those credits may transfer.

SUNY Niagara accepts credit cards and checks. Cash payments can only be made in person at the Cashier's Office. If the check you submit to SUNY Niagara for payment is returned for insufficient funds from the bank, you will be contacted by the college. You must provide a new check to the college. Failure to do so will result in your course(s) being dropped from the college, and no college credit will be received.

The registration form will be due on a specific date, as posted on the registration form instructions. An invoice will be mailed with payment options and due date.

Failure to pay by the deadline will result in removal from courses for college credit.

TUITION

CAP Courses are offered at a reduced tuition rate. Tuition is based on the number of credits designated for your course. The CAP cost is currently \$87 a credit hour.

Academic Integrity Policy

Honest participation in academic endeavors fosters an environment in which optimal learning can take place and is consistent with the mission of SUNY Niagara. Academic misconduct is destructive to the spirit of an educational environment and, therefore, cannot be condoned.

The following definitions will apply:

1. The term “cheating” includes, but is not limited to, using or providing unauthorized assistance, including the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools, in taking quizzes, tests, examinations, or assignments; dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the instructor in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems or carrying out other assignments; the acquisition without permission of tests or other academic materials belonging to a member of the college’s faculty. Employing any individual other than the named registrant for a course to take that course in place of the actual registrant, including the evaluations and assignments upon which the course is graded, is strictly prohibited. This prohibition includes individuals who are concomitantly enrolled in the course in question.
2. The term “plagiarism” includes, but is not limited to, the use by paraphrase or direct quotation, of the published or unpublished work of another person or AI tool without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or by an agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials.
3. The term “academic misconduct” includes any or all forms of the above.

Unless an instructor has provided students with an alternative academic integrity policy at the start of the semester, the college policy that follows will apply:

1. For the first incidence of academic misconduct in a course, the student will receive a grade of F (or zero) for the test, assignment or activity.
2. If there is a second incidence in the same course, the student will receive a grade of F for the course.

The instructor who believes that an incidence of academic misconduct has occurred will discuss it immediately with the student. If, in the judgment of the instructor, the student has committed an act of academic misconduct or if the student admits that there has been misconduct, the instructor will assess the appropriate penalty.

Instances of admitted or proven academic misconduct should be reported in writing to the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The purpose of this reporting will be to track individuals who have repeated incidences. If such a pattern of behavior is found, the Vice President of Academic Affairs will determine an appropriate sanction on a case-by-case basis.

Students who think they have been treated unfairly may invoke the Academic Grievance procedure, which is explained in the student code of conduct handbook.

Student Code of Conduct

The College, like all communities, functions best when its members treat one another with honesty, fairness, respect and trust.

Every student is guaranteed due process in all college-related disciplinary matters when a student's college-related actions go beyond the exercise of inalienable rights guaranteed by law.

SUNY Niagara expects academic honesty and integrity from all students and believes it is an important aspect of each student's education and preparation for the future. Therefore, students should refrain from all forms of academic dishonesty such as cheating, plagiarism, etc.

Students in the CAP program are held to the same Code of Conduct as all other SUNY Niagara students.

SUNY Niagara reserves the right to dismiss students whose conduct is not in accordance with the code of student conduct for the College as published in the College Catalog.

Grading

A letter grade will be assigned to you by your high school instructor. Your final grade may be comprised of many different factors, such as tests, quizzes, reports and/or projects. Your instructor will provide the grading details to you on the course syllabus.

Student Rights Under FERPA

Your education records are protected under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), which gives you the right to access and request correction of your records, and limits who SUNY Niagara can share them with. CERTIFICATE OF RESIDENCE

An affidavit/application for Certificate of Residence is a legal document which is supplied to SUNY Niagara students who are **not** permanent residents of Niagara County. In Orleans County, students must also visit the County Treasurer's Office for additional documentation. In any case, the legal document must be notarized and returned to SUNY Niagara with registration materials.

COURSE WITHDRAWAL

Course withdrawal dates are listed on the High School Information Sheet.

Unofficial Withdrawal from a course occurs when a student discontinues a course prior to the time when the instructor can properly assign any earned grade. Excessive absence from class may be interpreted as an unofficial withdrawal. An F grade may be appropriate in this situation. An F is an instructor-initiated grade. Students should discuss the appropriateness of this grade with the faculty member.

Official Withdrawal from a course during the first three weeks of the semester signifies that the course will not be entered on the student's record. The only person who can request an official withdrawal from a course is the student.

Official Withdrawal from a course without academic penalty is permitted until the tenth week into the course. A grade of W will appear on the student's transcript.

Any official withdrawals are initiated by the student in the following ways:

- The student may contact his/her instructor, who contacts the CAP Coordinator for the withdrawal
- The student contacts the CAP Coordinator to request to withdraw from the course
- The student comes in person to the CAP Coordinator to withdraw from the course

STUDENTS WHO DO NOT OFFICIALLY WITHDRAW FROM A COURSE RUN THE RISK OF EARNING A FAILING GRADE ON THEIR SUNY NIAGARA TRANSCRIPT.

Important: If a student will be leaving the district, he/she must also complete a drop form to drop the class officially at the College.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who can apply?

Qualified high school students will be notified by the course instructor or school counselor of the opportunity to participate in the CAP Program. Students should be academically prepared for collegiate-level coursework. This decision is made by the guidance department or principal in conjunction with the local high school instructor who will teach the CAP course. Students should demonstrate motivation to work hard and be challenged, as college courses will make greater demands overall on a student. All courses with prerequisites must have this requirement met prior to enrollment in the course(s).

What if I don't do well in the course?

Most students thrive in CAP courses because they're learning in a familiar environment, often with a teacher they already know and trust, and they've been recommended by school staff who recognize their strong academic potential. Your instructor will monitor everyone's progress in class and notify those students who have a D or F at midterm. This will allow you to discuss with your instructor what is needed to bring your grade up to passing. ***If you wish to drop the course, you must contact the SUNY NIAGARA CAP Coordinator immediately. You will then need to complete a WITHDRAWAL FORM.*** This form is available online. Complete the form and give it to your instructor who will determine whether you can withdraw from the course, request an S/U grade (Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory) or whether you receive an F. ***Do not disregard this policy; it can become very costly (financially and academically) if you disregard it.***

What if I decide not to attend SUNY Niagara?

The college credit you earn upon successful completion of a CAP course may be transferable to other colleges and universities. The majority of other institutions offer similar programs and will accept credits from other schools. However, transfer of credit is not guaranteed, and each college or university decides whether to accept the coursework.

To send your credits to another school, you must complete a transcript request form directly through SUNY Niagara (see page 5). This electronic form, along with the required payment, is processed by the Records Office. An official transcript will then be issued and mailed to the schools you designate.

What if my college will not accept my SUNY Niagara credits?

Some colleges may not accept any transfer credits. Others may grant exemptions from certain courses or allow you to enroll in higher-level classes based on your CAP

participation. Each institution makes its own determination. Some colleges may also require you to submit a course syllabus, which your instructor can help you obtain. It is essential to follow up with your intended college regarding your SUNY Niagara credits:

- Confirm that your SUNY Niagara transcript has been received.
- Speak with the appropriate college official to explain your participation in CAP.
- Provide the course syllabus and/or course description from the SUNY Niagara catalog, if required.
- If you experience difficulty, please contact Academic Affairs at SUNY Niagara to request assistance.

Will my credits be wasted if my college does not accept them?

Absolutely not. These credits are yours and they will remain on your SUNY Niagara transcript permanently. If you transfer to another college, you may still be able to apply them toward your degree.

Each time you apply to a new college or university, you will need to submit a transcript request to have your grades sent directly to that school, as colleges do not forward transcripts to other institutions.

Even if your current college does not accept the credits, the experience of completing a college-level course in high school is excellent preparation for future academic success.
